Within and between these various events lies the entire Scopus experience, and indeed the essence of what that experience means.

'A Scopus education' means giving our graduates the tools to maximise their academic potential and to achieve entry into the tertiary course of their choice, at the same time as providing opportunities for their all-round character development. Ulpan record

Israel plays a central role at Scopus and for over 70 students the coming months will see them live and breathe the Israel experience first hand.

In our 25th year of offering Year 10 students the opportunity to travel to Israel on Ulpan, we have added a third dimension to the program. A group of students left in October to spend 5 weeks living with host families on a number of kibbutzim in the Beit She'an area in the Jordan Valley. They attended high school with their host brother/sister and participated fully in kibbutz life.

After this time they joined the 8 week program which included 2 weeks on the Ulpan Akiva program to improve the students' Hebrew language skills. They all then joined the students currently on the 6 week educational program of classes, tours, and volunteer work.

Jewish and proud

One of the leading figures in the Jewish world today, Chief Ashkenazi Rabbi of Israel, Yona Metzger urged students to be proud Jews when he spoke at Scopus recently.

"Our religion and our Yiddishkeit is a first class religion and we have to be proud to be Jewish", Rabbi Metzger said.

As the first Israeli born chief rabbi and also the first chief rabbi to have served in the Israel Defence Force, he told students they have a responsibility to carry on our traditions, just as previous generations had done.

"One can live in a modern world and still keep Jewish traditions in both body and soul", he said. He invited the students to visit Israel and experience a modern country where they can also see and touch their history. He explained how in Israel they can touch the same stones in the Wailing Wall as King Solomon did, and walk the same paths as our forefathers.

Leaving Scopus to go directly to the airport, Rabbi Metzger blessed the students with "Le'shana Haba'a B'Yerushalayim Habnuya".

New twist on an old favourite

Playing the childhood 'memory game' has never been so much fun for Scopus students.

The introduction of new electronic whiteboards has allowed teachers to extend learning in a whole new way.

Scopus' new electronic whiteboards with their 'touch screen' capability and the opportunities for interactive learning are revolutionising the traditional classroom.

In a recent Year 5 Maths class, teacher Claire Gescheit created a Maths game based on the memory game concept where

students had to uncover hidden words on the whiteboard touch screen to find a matching pair. The immediate nature of the whiteboard engaged the whole class in a fun learning activity.

Controlled either by a laptop computer, wireless mouse or directly by touching/writing on the screen with special giant electronic pencils, individual students have the ability to add their answers and comments to the whiteboard during class discussions, thus creating a true sense of ownership of their learning.

While the uses of the new electronic whiteboards in the teaching of Scopus' International Baccalaureate Primary Years Programme are virtually unlimited, the motivation to try new things has been extremely high so far.

The engaging nature of the whiteboards will ensure they are used in the teaching of most subjects, including Hebrew and Jewish Studies.

Scopus plans to have 30 electronic whiteboards installed in both Primary and Secondary classrooms by the start of the 2008 school year.

Scopus has its very own professional scientist in the Primary School.

Under the Department of Education, Science and Training's 'Scientists in Schools' pilot program, Mount Scopus has been paired with Dr Scott Watkins, a Research Scientist with CSIRO Molecular and Health Technologies.

The 'Scientists in Schools' program is designed to promote science education in Primary and Secondary Schools, help to engage and motivate students in their learning of science, and broaden awareness of the types and variety of exciting careers available in the sciences. Over 250 teacher-scientist partnerships have been formed across Australia.

As we further implement the International Baccalaureate Primary Years Programme (PYP), teachers are working with Dr Watkins looking at ways to further link science and scientific concepts into their classroom units of work.

"We want to bring the outside in", explains Scopus PYP Co-ordinator Layla Sacker. "Dr Watkins is helping us make our program of inquiry real and relevant for students by working with staff to incorporate our local environment into our unit of work on sustainability."

In an ongoing partnership, Dr Watkins will continue to act in a consultant role across all Primary campuses and has already given staff some great ideas and contacts.

5 things from the Archives

1. The Baron Snider Public Speaking Competition was named after Baron David Snider, MLA for St Kilda 1955 to 1964, Liberal Country Party. He was responsible for the Federal Government making restitution payments to German refugees tax-free. His commitment to oratorical skills was honoured by the school community with the public speaking competition, and the College acquired a perpetual shield and bust crafted by local artist, Bella Kowadlo, in his memory.
2. In the 1976 House Plays, Monash performed 'The Bespoke Overcoat', produced by Karen Antman and David Green. Hillel chose 'The Dear Departed' produced by Nicole Stransky and Adam Slonim. Bialik's play 'Signals' was written in-house and produced by Debbie Glass and David Milecki; and Ashkanasy performed 'There's No Business' produced by Ashley Bush, who won the award for best producer.
3. The first School Captains (then called Prefects) were Peter Medding, Daniel Lew, Felicity Bartak and Louise Goulburn in 1951.
4. The Ulpan Program began in 1982, and this year will see the largest contingent of students ever to participate in the program.
