Faces of Israel

Israel came to Scopus recently, in the form of an innovative Israel activity for Year 8 students.

As part of the Israel Studies unit within Judaic Studies, Israeli society was represented by eight activity stations, symbolising different segments of contemporary Israel. Students chose different stations and had specific duties to perform according to the nature of the station.

Stations included the army, a kibbutz, an absorption centre, Hebrew University, a hitech company, a travel agency, Sherut Leumi (National Service) and a yeshiva. At each station students had to complete a task and were awarded points in terms of happiness, spirituality, money and national service. There were eight rounds to the game.

This activity was an excellent example of experiential learning, where students entered a different space – both physically and imaginatively. The students learnt through their own actions, decisions, dynamic involvement and engagement. Staff members of the Informal Jewish Education Department together with our Sherut Leumi young women and youth movement madrichim (mostly Old Collegians) were involved in planning, setting up and running the program.

THREE GENERATIONS OF SCOPUS GRADUATES, BEN AND ANTON GRODECK AND NEHAMA PATKIN

As Ben Grodeck walked out of his final Year 12 exam he walked into the College's history books, as the first 3rd generation student to graduate from Mount Scopus College.

Ben's father, Anton Grodeck, graduated in 1978 and his grandmother, Nehama Patkin OAM in 1955, having been one of the first students enrolled at the College.

His great-grandfather, Benzion Patkin, supported by wife Hemda, was a founder of Mount Scopus and as Ben readily admits, "Scopus is in my blood".

Ben recalls one of the highlights of his years at Scopus as the wonderful informal Jewish education he received.

"Every Chag there was an incredible atmosphere and it was always fun".

He also acknowledges the huge range of opportunities available at Scopus today and is grateful for the chance to play interschool hockey, take part in camps and leadership programs and be involved in the SRC.

"The school definitely brought out the best in me."

"Dinner time conversation at home now includes my dad telling us how good it was at Scopus in the 1970s, as he celebrated his 30 year reunion this year." Ben said.

Anton Grodeck, now a member of School Council agrees there is distinctive buzz about the school that he feels every time he visits.

"It's an atmosphere of students who are busy being involved; not just in their studies but in informal Jewish programs, the arts, sports and charitable work. It's never been just a school, it's a community."

"This seems to breed a confidence in the students and a very strong sense of their own identity as members of the Scopus community and as young Jewish Australians."

Anton added, "I grew up with the knowledge that it was through the vision of my grandfather, Benzion Patkin, that Scopus was established. I am confident he would be immensely satisfied with

what has been achieved in 60 years and of course, exceptionally proud that his great grandson is the first of the third generation to graduate".

Nehama Patkin agrees, "I am totally overawed by the size of the buildings and the surrounding grounds. If only my father could see now what his vision has become. I do not believe for one moment he could have foreseen this incredible outcome!"

"I remember my very first day in February 1949, sitting in a classroom in a St Kilda Road building with only one other student in Grade 6. I was only nine years old and couldn't quite comprehend what all the fuss was about, but had a feeling that I was part of the birth of something historic."

Nehama recalls, "In my first years at the school all the young girls were taught the importance of keeping a Kosher home. Learning how to make liver kosher in a tiny kitchen on the St Kilda Road campus will remain indelibly imprinted in my mind forever!

Today I see students from Kindergarten to Year 12 being given the best possible Jewish education and am immensely proud. In Ben I see the result of what Mount Scopus offers – a sound secular education with a very rounded Jewish knowledge.

Scopus safe crackers

A team of Year 11 students will travel to Israel next year to compete in the worldwide Shalheveth Freier Physics Tournament at the Weizmann Institute of Science.

Lenny Bloom, Mark Bloom, Tomer Simovich and Shaanan Cohney will compete in the two day tournament in March 2009, accompanied by physics teacher Alan Madden. They are the first Australian team to take part in this prestigious competition.

Each year, the Weizmann Institute hosts the greatest safecracking challenge known to high school students, as they strive to build a safe that only they can open, and then try to crack the safes of all the other teams.

Each team must use simple materials to build a lock that operates on a combination of advanced physical principles, and is able to be opened in less than five minutes, but that will keep opponents stumped for at least twice that time.

Entries are scored for being pick-proof, as well as originality and elegant application of one or more physics principles. Teams score added points for every safe they manage to crack.

The Scopus team have already begun preparing for the competition and have now settled on their 'top secret' design.

With students from around the world participating, the tournament will be an excellent opportunity for our students to work with like minded physics students. In addition, the exposure to the first class postgraduate Physics Department at the Weizmann Institute will enhance their learning enormously.

Overall, the experience of 'thinking physics' under competitive pressure will be a hugely positive learning experience.

The College appreciates the assistance of supporters who are making this possible.


