Shoah pebbles

Students paid a very personal and unique tribute to child victims of the Holocaust through the 'Child to Child' or 'Shoah: MeYeled LeYeled' project.

In preparation for Yom HaShoah, students in Years 6-9 researched the name and some information about a child who died in the Shoah. They then painted individual butterfly designs, their own name and the name of a child who died onto white pebbles, to dedicate as a memory.

The butterfly motif was chosen from the poem 'I Never Saw Another Butterfly', written by Pavel Friedman in Theresienstadt camp, and because the butterfly symbolises freedom.

The students painted on pebbles as it is a pebble that Jews place on a grave as a symbol of remembrance.

Year 8 bilingual students also wrote essays in Hebrew about their chosen child's life, so they felt a special link to the child who died.

The project culminated with the pebbles being glazed and mounted into a memorial in time for Yom HaShoah.

As part of the IBO Middle Years Program, Head of the Loti Smorgon School of Visual Arts, Sara Warner, extended the initial Year 8 bilingual class project across other year levels and media.

It's 8.15am and a member of staff has fallen in the corridor – the work day has begun for Gandel Campus Matron, Michelle Jackson.

From the first tummy ache of the day to the last sprained ankle on the sports field, the caring staff in the First Aid and Nursing Centre are constantly busy.

In between tending to students with headaches, toothaches, rashes and insect bites throughout the school day, lunchtimes bring a new stream of footy injuries and playground stoushes to attend to.

Registered nurses at the Gandel Campus and GBH, and a trained first aider at FKI, also ensure staff taking excursions have a stocked first aid kit, keep records of students' medical conditions and allergies and brief teachers taking camps and sports events on specific students and their medical needs.

In addition, they organise annual vision tests for all Year 8 students, physiotherapy checks for Year 7 girls and Year 8 boys, medical checks for Preps and immunisations for students.

Nursing staff attend College Occupational Health and Safety meetings, the Victorian School Nurse Campus Group, and also meet regularly with the College's honorary physicians.

Offering a retreat for 'time out', sick bay nurses also offer emotional support and a little TLC (tender loving care) when needed.

The First Aid Centre is also equipped to cope with more serious emergencies thanks to the generous donation of a defibrillator.

Lights, Camera, Action!

Year 6 students have embarked on an innovative Media Studies project. In a first for Scopus, Year 6 students are being introduced to the exciting world of media studies in a dynamic and hands-on way.

In a society bombarded by ever increasing information through film and television, recognising truth, bias and persuasion are more necessary than ever. Students in Year 6 are studying the art of film making and how our ideas, feelings and attitudes are influenced through the craft, skills and technology of the filmmaker.

External media producers are helping to teach our students and teachers about the technical side of film making, guiding them through the complex process of story boarding, filming and editing their own short films in a range of workshops. Students are working in small collaborative teams to develop a short film in which they explore a big theme. Themes such as 'identity', 'conflict' or 'loneliness' form the basis of the script development.

This 'multiple intelligences' project will engage students and enable them to explore their own intelligences in a novel and purposeful way. Our students will be able to use many talents and skills and have the opportunity to write music, scripts and story boards, as well as act, produce and direct their films.

Scopus enrichment

Recently appointed Primary Extension and Enrichment Facilitators, Sue Shee and Lana Fleiszig, are breathing new life into our Primary curriculum and working towards ensuring every child works at their appropriate level of stimulation and challenge.

Operating across all three Primary campuses, they are working alongside classroom teachers to provide the knowledge and resources to allow teachers to differentiate the curriculum for all their students.

In this way they are catering to every student's individual interests, ability and learning style.

Continuing Scopus' long history of success in national and international external competitions, Sue and Lana are also working with students and teachers on events such as Future Problem Solving and Tournament of Minds.

In Middle School (Years 7-9), Jenni Krafchek has been presenting information to staff on how to differentiate assignments and classroom worksheets by adding open-ended tasks and more complex, higher level questions as options for gifted students.

Middle School students are also involved in external competitions including Future Problem Solving, the National History Challenge and Tournament of Minds. A new Year 7 Creative Writing Club has also been formed.

Keen science students are developing investigations for the CSIRO CREST Science awards and Scopus will enter a team in the National Year 7 Da Vinci Decathlon – an academic games day where students compete in challenges such as mathematics, code breaking, art and poetry, english, science, an engineering building task, and general knowledge.

The Game of life

Chess, a game of skill and strategy, has been introduced into the learning lives of our primary students.

At Gandel Besen House, Year 2 students have been taught the aims of the game and the various moves of each chess piece. The children explored the protocol of playing chess, ie: 'You touch it, you move it', as well as 'en passant.' The exotic vocabulary of chess has certainly stimulated the children's interest in language, as they discover the skewer, stalemate, sacrifice, and that a forced sacrifice is called a 'zugzwang'.

Year 1 students will also experience chess this term, with Year 3 students having a go in Term 3. In addition, a master chess class runs at lunchtime for more skilled players.

Fink Karp Ivany students achieved second place in the recent Victorian Interschool Chess Championships. The teams played a total of seven rounds and the children showed amazing concentration and focus.

The universal game of chess compliments our PYP curriculum as it allows students to enhance their thinking skills and to problem-solve using a wide range of strategies. The children are practising values such as patience and respect and are learning to take their time and plan their moves.

As evident by the studious faces and shouts of jubilation, our students have taken to chess like ducks to water.

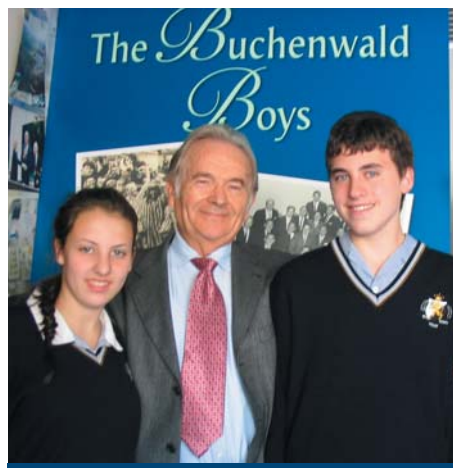

Buchenwald exhibit

Scopus students have heard from the Buchenwald Boys first hand.

While an exhibition on the Buchenwald Boys was on display at the College, it was the survivor guides who really had an impact on students.

Talking to Years 9 and 10 students about their experiences and answering questions, Mr Joe Szwarcberg, Mr Szaja Chaskiel and Mr Salek Roth guided students through the exhibit, explaining the incredible story of their survival.

On 11 April 1945, 900 youths, mostly orphans, were liberated from Buchenwald Concentration Camp in Germany. Fifty-four of them were sent to Melbourne to begin a new life. In the absence of family, they formed strong friendships and still meet regularly. Their story is one of human resilience and courage.

The exhibit coincided with Yom HaShoah (Holocaust remembrance) commemorations, and was linked to the secondary school Yom HaShoah assembly to provide a more rounded educational experience. All Year 10 students study the Shoah for a term as part of their Jewish Studies curriculum, so this exhibition certainly brought their classroom learning to life.

The College was proud to host this exhibition, which had previously been on display at the Immigration Museum in 2005.

MYP – An individual approach

The IBO Middle Years Program (MYP) allows us to differentiate the curriculum to meet individual learning needs.

Students can choose how they approach a task. This takes advantage of their preferred learning style and encourages them to take ownership and become more engaged in the learning process.

Year 9 Humanities students experienced the benefits of differentiated learning in a research project about the Middle Ages. Guiding questions were provided to facilitate research and draw them into higher-level thinking. Students initially brainstormed together so they could be exposed to others' ideas, and a list of choices about how to present their findings was outlined.

Support was provided to enable students to map out and articulate the process taken step-by-step, until they arrived at the final outcome for presentation. When students take this approach they learn about learning.

Student Merav Chait elaborated, "Some of the choices were poems, plays, models, manuscripts of the time and story books. I chose to write a diary from the point of view of Joan of Arc, and also do a booklet of information on the Middle Ages. After the final presentation I became a Middle Ages know-it-all. It was a great way to learn and a lot of fun to do."

The MYP clearly demonstrates the value of catering for students with different learning styles, and allows extension into our gifted and talented programs.
