From the Principal

The shape of education in Australia is changing. The initiatives of the Federal Government – the publication of the NAPLAN assessments undertaken by all children in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 and the Australian Curriculum – will bring an increased level of accountability and rigour to all schools in the country.

At Scopus we look forward to these new challenges. Our academic results are consistently extremely high (crowned by our students' success as the highest performing cohort of VCE candidates in Victoria in 2009) and we are already using the NAPLAN data to consolidate strengths and identify areas for development.

Having successfully embraced the curricula and philosophy of the International Baccalaureate's Primary

Years Programme and Middle Years Programme, the introduction of the Australian Curriculum, phased in over the next few years, will provide a further opportunity for us to reflect on our teaching and our students' learning and to ensure that each continues to meet the highest standards.

These externally-introduced changes complement the internally-led developments that the College has seen over the last few years. Increased opportunities in the Performing Arts; an expansion of the Informal Jewish Education programme; more excursions both locally and overseas, amongst many other areas of expansion, have transformed many aspects of College life whilst maintaining fidelity to our values and ethos.

Most obviously, our physical shape is changing; the new classrooms at Gandel Besen House and the new Upper Primary School building on the Gandel Campus are taking shape before our eyes. These will provide a state of the art learning environment at the start of next year, while the other campuses continue to be updated and renovated. Our 'Ready to Roar' campaign will be seeking the involvement of the entire school community to help bring this vision to reality.

Progress, allied with continuity, is manifest throughout Scopus – in the classroom, outside the classroom and in the shape of the classroom itself.

Kitchen Garden Opens

Our new Kitchen Garden was officially opened recently.

Principal, Rabbi James Kennard, officially opened the centre, and Head of Smorgon Family Primary School, Mr Greg Hannon, thanked Old Collegians Danny Almagor and Berry Liberman for their support and involvement in this special project,

as well as the many key people who helped make it all possible. Treats made in the kitchen were then served by our students.

In 2009 Smorgon Family Primary School established its own Kitchen Garden Program for Years 4 and 5 students. Throughout last year the garden was planned and planted and kitchen facilities set up.

From the start of 2010 students have enjoyed fortnightly lessons in the garden with a qualified horticulturalist and have quickly discovered the pleasure of hands-on food education. Time spent working in the vegetable garden, followed by a double class in the home style kitchen classroom, have allowed students to build and maintain the garden according to organic gardening principles and grow and harvest a wide

variety of vegetables, fruits and herbs. In the kitchen, led by a kitchen specialist, the children prepare delicious meals from seasonal produce they have grown.

The Kitchen Garden Program touches on all key learning areas and there is enormous potential for our students to use the program to enhance their mathematical, literacy and inquiry skills.

Building for the Future

Building works are progressing well at both Gandel Besen House and the new upper primary school building at the Gandel Campus.

At Gandel Besen House the building is really starting to take shape and both students and staff are excited to watch the daily progress as we get closer to lock-up stage.

Work on the roofing is almost complete and the internal fit out on the ground floor has commenced. All mechanical, electrical, plumbing and air conditioning infrastructure and pipe work will be installed, before the internal walls and ceiling go up. External cladding has also started and the windows are being installed.

The new two storey building will provide open, flexible and interactive learning spaces for Prep to Year 3 students, allowing us to truly teach in the way children learn.

On the Gandel Campus work is also progressing swiftly on the new upper primary school building for Years 4-6 students. Adjacent to the Besen Family Performing Arts Centre, it will incorporate flexible learning spaces, allowing classrooms to be used in a variety of ways. There will also be a designated Year 6 'work, rest and play' zone combined with an Informal Jewish Education centre and wireless access throughout.

The concrete slabs and structural steel work to support both floors are complete and work on the roof will commence shortly. Fit out works on the ground floor have started and all services will be completed before the internal walls and ceiling are added.

Both projects incorporate the use of recycled water, energy saving lights and air conditioning, in environmentally sustainable designs.

In a nutshell, our redevelopment includes a new Gandel Besen House primary school, a new upper primary school building at the Gandel Campus, Burwood and new furniture and air-conditioning in key areas of the Secondary School. Also incorporated are new recreational and sporting areas. Behind the designs are the values of the College's mission statement and the ideals of the International Baccalaureate Organisation's Primary Years Programme.

School fee income is not used for capital works and Scopus continues to support its students with subsidised tuition fees. In 2010, one quarter of our growing student population is being assisted. Scopus acknowledges the generous support and involvement of the community over 60 years, which has contributed to its achievements and significance for our community.

The Mount Scopus College Foundation has taken up the challenge to raise the funds required to complete all the current projects. Government stimulus funding has provided less than one quarter of the cost. Even after taking into account the funding and our existing reserves, the Foundation needs to raise in excess of \$10 million.

Improving Students' Learning

Students will benefit from three new projects being implemented by innovative Scopus staff.

Winning one of three new Principal's Special Grants, John Condello, Dana Rosenzweig and Fiona Birkin each devised projects to enhance students' learning and add another dimension to the curriculum.

Head of Science, John Condello and his team are creating a freshwater ecosystem within the College grounds, to allow students to monitor, understand and care for our environment. Students will grow and study plant and animal specimens, typical of a balanced ecosystem, in a specially designed pond. The project will also set up an ecological area of study for Primary students relating to their Kitchen Garden Project and Science units of work.

Jewish Studies teacher at Fink Karp Ivany campus, Dana Rosenzweig, will help kinder children at all three campuses to better understand and enjoy the celebration of chagim with her unique 'Chag in a Box' collection of resources. Students will experience real artefacts to touch and explore for each festival, in a resource that can be used by teachers year after year.

Upper Primary students will benefit from 20 new Ipod Touch, in a program initiated by Librarian Fiona Birkin. The 'Learners in Touch with Learning' program will see students use Ipod Touch devices for audio books, podcasts, ebooks and numerous educational applications. Students will be able to record interviews for inquiry units and create podcasts to be listened to by their peers and teachers.

Rabbi Kennard said, "There were a number of excellent proposals and it was a tough choice to select the three winners. In the end I opted for three different projects that covered a range of ages (kinder, primary and secondary), the range of the curriculum (Literacy, Science and Jewish Studies) and that would make an immediate and lasting impact on our students' learning."

King David Linksfield Visits

Earlier this term, the College hosted a visit by students from the King David Linksfield School in Johannesburg, South Africa.

A group of 43 Years 10-12 students and accompanying staff travelled to Australia for a three week sporting tour of Melbourne and Sydney.

In addition to playing both Scopus and local teams in a variety of sports, the group visited many Melbourne tourist attractions including Healesville Sanctuary, Scienceworks, MCG, and Victoria Market.

On the field they competed in Touch Rugby, Netball and Girls' Soccer as well as Rugby Union against a local under 18 side. The students also spent time at school with their hosts and attended the moving Yom Ha'Shoah assembly run by our students.

Gan Gani is a program specially designed for toddlers aged two and up who are due to start Lower Kinder the following year.

Up to 10 children attend a one hour session each week during school term either at FKI or GBH, accompanied by a parent, grandparent or carer. They participate in a range of activities, including free play, music, movement, stories and craft activities, helping to develop independent play and social interaction. The sessions also allow parents to meet and socialise. Children can attend for one term or for the whole year, with priority given in the second half of the year to children who will be attending a Scopus kinder.

Kabbalat Shabbat is a highlight of each session with children enjoying kiddush 'wine' (grape juice) and challah, and singing Shabbat songs. Throughout the year the chagim are celebrated, introducing the children to the Jewish calendar.

Parents are also invited to parent education evenings every term on topics as diverse as toilet training, developing resilience in young children and language and speech development.

The new coordinators at each campus are excited to be working with our youngest Scopus community members. Amelia Kalifa at FKI and Tahni Grinblat at GBH are both qualified educators, Old Collegians and parents of young children at the College.

In line with its founding philosophy Mount Scopus College continues to support its students with subsidised tuition fees.



Reunion Made History


